...A PARROT LIKE BANANAS.

Bananas, an endangered Timneh Parrot, was first noted as having gone missing from a nest cavity that was being monitored by researchers in West Africa. Their worst fears were realised when they saw fresh marks around the cavity and went to check on the nestling inside...and saw that he was gone.

The discovery triggered a search but remarkably, five days later, he was anonymously returned to the field staff. With little experience or resources the scientists were now faced with caring for a weakened, hungry chick. They adopted a menu used by former trappers: cooked rice with palm oil, ground roasted peanuts and what quickly became the baby's favorite, bananas.



With advice from the WPT and the University Institute of Portugal they fed the chick until he was strong enough to be returned to the nest. Against all odds, the parents returned and began feeding him again.

Bananas was able to grow up and join his flock, flying free out in the big, wild world.
